Its Easter Sunday! Resurrection Sunday! One of the many holidays celebrated which have their origin in Christianity and this is one of the two most important days especially with the increasing secularization and post-Christian world in which we are living.

Nothing is more important historically or theologically than the birth, death, and resurrection of Jesus. These three events, celebrated on the holidays of Christmas and Easter, continue to draw attention worldwide and especially in the west (Europe and the Americas). 
